FAMILY STABILITY

ENSURING MORE FAMILIES ARE STRONG AND SECURE.

Community Rebuilders is breaking down the stigma surrounding homelessness.

"We commonly hear people say that if somebody is experiencing homelessness, they need to get a job. While there's a critical need for employment and financial resources to obtain and maintain housing, many families we work with have employment," clarified Maranda VanZegeren, Divisional Director at Community Rebuilders.

This was the case with a recent client, Miranda Marie. "I came to Community Rebuilders to avoid eviction. I worked in a school, and my hours had been cut drastically during COVID, so I fell behind on rent."

Through their HOME program, Community Rebuilders assists residents with securing and maintaining housing. As leaseholders, participants receive short-term rental assistance for 6–12 months. Afterwards, tenants maintain their housing without any type of assistance.

"I worked with my Housing Resource Specialist, and she was such a great support. The whole process, from paperwork to working with my landlord, was completely seamless. They made a difficult time in my life much easier to handle, and I could tell that I wasn't just a number to them," said Miranda Marie.

HOME offers voluntary, housing-focused supportive services based on each household's wants and needs. Staff partner with clients to achieve their goals to maintain long-term housing once they exit the program. Together, they find solutions that meet each client's needs, including making referrals to other community partners to promote housing stability. By connecting with local

resources, clients improve their access to healthcare, nutrition, education, and economic stability.

"United Way supports case management services for Kent County residents facing homelessness or at risk of homelessness," explained Samantha Elliot-Mosley, Community Rebuilders' Director of Advancement and Communication. "It's really helpful because it gives us flexibility to provide supportive services. We're able to use this funding to address the need for safe, decent, and quality housing for low-income households."

Thanks to the assistance she received through HOME, Miranda Marie is thriving once again.

"Now, almost a full year later, I'm still in my home, and I'm back to working full time. The program gave me the chance to stabilize in a way that I wouldn't have been able to without support, and I'm so appreciative for everything they've done for me."

ENSURING MORE ADULTS BUILD A BRIGHTER FUTURE.

OUR GOAL

Kent County residents who seek employment, educational training, and job transportation will have opportunities to improve economic stability. Two years after graduation, Lisa felt discouraged when she couldn't find a job in her field. But that changed when she found the Empower program.

"Every time I attend a Women's Resource Center event, my confidence improves," said Lisa, who came to WRC for help securing a job after college. "I still struggle at times, but my Career Coach is such a great mentor. She makes me believe in myself and that I can do this."

WRC's Empower program offers career coaching to help women move toward economic independence and provides both career and life skill development. Career Coaches also work to address each participant's personal and unique needs.

"The beauty of the program is that it serves a wide range of women," said Michelle Bryk, Program Director at WRC. "Many women come to us after living in generational poverty, and they realize they want to make a change."

Lisa's Career Coach led her through mock interviews and helped her gain confidence in the interview process. She learned how to build a resume and write a cover letter, and eventually felt empowered to take on a one-year certificate program at Michigan State University. Lisa is now a social worker who specializes in working with combat veterans.

Michelle Bryk explained, "Without United Way funding, we couldn't be doing the programming we have. What we do is people intensive, and we need to have the staff and resources available at the center."

Lisa felt a sense of community and belonging at Women's Resource Center, where everyone knew her by name and asked how she was doing. She found people who genuinely cared about her future and believed in her.

"Unity of women is something we need to foster more," said Lisa, "And at Women's Resource Center, they do. I can't wait until I'm in a place where I can give back to WRC for all that they've done for me."

YOUTH EDUCATION

ENSURING MORE STUDENTS ARE READY TO LEARN AND SUCCEED.

OUR GOAL

Kent County middle school students improve achievement in seventh-grade science and eighth-grade math. After graduating from City High Middle School in 2017, Cindy began attending Michigan State University (MSU). Though the transition to college was difficult, T2C Studio: Grand Rapids Center for College Success was with her through it all.

"It was a culture shock. I felt out of place as a Latina woman. T2C Studio has a welcoming environment and helped me complete my education."

Cindy benefited from many services, including college application support, FAFSA assistance, resume and cover letter assistance, and social-emotional support. "They helped me make connections on campus that I couldn't make on my own."

Through Our Community's Children, a public/private partnership between the City of Grand Rapids, Grand Rapids Public Schools (GRPS), and community partners, T2C Studio offers navigational, financial, and one-on-one support services to students going to and through college. The program focuses on increasing the number of GRPS students who receive a college degree, especially first-generation college students and people of color.

"The whole premise is not just to get them to college, but also to get them through. Thanks to United Way, we've been able to expand those "through" efforts and sustain them," said Dr. Shayla Young, Director of T2C Studio.

At MSU, Cindy made the Dean's List and loved going to classes. But after her first year, she became pregnant. "I was scared to reach out for help. Should I drop out and take care of my child? Or do I keep going?"

As the first in her family to attend college, Cindy wanted to be a role model for her siblings. "I didn't want to drop out, that's for sure. I wanted to get this degree. I have four young children looking up to me, and I didn't want to let them down."

After receiving support from her advisor at MSU, Dr. Young, and Sue Garza with To College, Through College, she was able to take a year off without losing her financial aid. "Thankfully, they were able to get me connected and figure that out."

Now, Cindy interns with Our Community's Children and is on track to graduate with her bachelor's degree in social work. She credits T2C Studio for playing a crucial role for students navigating college.

"It gives students an opportunity to feel like they belong and believe they can do it. I'm very thankful for how T2C Studio has helped me."


